There has never been a more exciting time to become a partner with one of Hudson's fastest growing cultural amenities. Thanks to continued support from many of you, Case-Barlow Farm has come a long way since being incorporated as a 501c3 organization in 1996.

- The house has been restored on the 1st floor and is available to northeast Ohio individuals, organizations and businesses for meetings, special events and programs.
- The colonial garden, a project of the Case-Barlow Farm Garden Group, provides gardeners a unique study of assorted heirloom perennials suitable for local planting.
- Walkways have been rebuilt with commemorative bricks now included at most membership levels.
- The barn has a brand new roof and a new sub floor. And, yes, the floor in the barn is dry.
- The garage has a new cement floor, restored windows and a new garage door. It is now secure from the elements.

However, there remains much to do as we focus on the following:

- Completing the renovation and repairs to the barn for future use as one of Hudson's largest historic indoor gathering places.
- Restoring and renovating the granary and corn crib.
- Landscaping of the grounds.

In an effort to raise much needed funding, Case-Barlow Farm has formally launched a Membership Drive for 2010. To maintain the Farm's ongoing operation, quality programs and continued improvements, our membership dollars form the core of our funding support. We are reaching out to both past and prospective members within the community and beyond as we strive to expand our base and raise awareness of the historic treasure that is Case-Barlow Farm.



ICL Facilitates Diversity Training For Achievement Center for Children

On March 8th and 9th, 2010, Institute for Creative Leadership facilitated diversity training for thirty staff from the Achievement Center for Children. The fact that this training was held at Case-Barlow Farm, a historically designed Underground Railroad site, added to the richness of learning throughout the sessions.

The attendees discussed the many 'take-aways' they experienced from this active and engaging training. They shared the importance of viewing the world from other ways in order to operate from a more informed viewpoint. They understand that strong and sustained efforts are needed to make sure that others don't become excluded/marginalized because of ignorance or biases. They can better see others' diversities as being equally valuable as their own. They know that they must create movement, not just motions, so they can better meet their diversity leadership obligations, responsibilities and challenges.

As one attendee stated, "As a society, we have made remarkable gains, but there is much more that can still be done. I need to push more to broaden my influence in positive ways. What am I waiting for?"

The Achievement Center for Children is one of many northeast Ohio agencies in the Alcohol and Drug Addiction/Mental Health Services Board of Cuyahoga County network to take advantage of ICL's leadership, team building and diversity/cultural competence training.

CBF Garden Group

The garden is open for the 2010 growing season. For the past three years, we have been dealing with deer, groundhogs, rabbits and raccoons eating everything that is green. Earlier this spring we installed a wire fence around the perimeters of the garden and buried it six inches into the ground. Hopefully, this will be a deterrent.

The garden group will be attending the Crown Point Heirloom Plant Sale in hopes of finding plants that were used in a mid-1800's farm garden. Since we are trying to be as organic as possible, a couple of techniques for avoiding the use of pesticides and herbicides are: (1) plant rotation and (2) companion planting. At Case-Barlow Farm we chart our garden each year to prevent repeat plantings from year to year; thus, plant rotation. An example of companion planting (friends

and foes) would be: Beans are friends with--beets, carrots, corn, radishes and tomatoes, and are foes with --garlic, onions, peppers and sunflowers. Check out the "The Old Farmer's Almanac" for more examples. These methods have been proven and used by gardeners for centuries. Here are a couple of rhymes from New Hampshire author and organic gardener Jeanne Prevett Sable:

"Beets of red should never bed

With beans of green, nor mustard wed."

"Many vegetables love the potato,

Which shuns its own cousins, eggplant and tomato."
