
2nd Annual Doll House Exhibit & Holiday Tea

- The house has been completely restored on the first floor and is available to northeast Ohio organizations and businesses for meetings, special events and programs. Some of the second floor is being restored now.
- The colonial garden, a project of the Case-Barlow Farm Garden Group, provides gardeners a unique study of assorted heirloom perennials suitable for local planting.
- Roof replacement was made to the rare bank barn and a sub-floor added to the 2nd level. Walkways have been rebuilt with commemorative bricks purchased in previous membership campaigns.

However, there remains much to do as we focus on the future.

- Completing the renovation and repairs to the historic barn for future use as one of Hudson's largest indoor gathering places.
- Restoring and renovating the Granary/wagon shed, and corn crib.
- Landscaping of the grounds including installation of a split rail fence at the Barlow Road perimeter.

Thank you for your previous support in helping us install the commemorative brick walkways near the farmhouse over the past 2 years. We again ask for your assistance in our effort to build a split rail fence along the Barlow Road entrance to the property. You can help us with this effort through your 2011 Annual Membership. The Creative Writing Club



The Old Corn Crib Is Getting a New Look

This may not look like much, but the corn crib is on its way to being restored. Thanks to your support through events and membership, Sugar Creek Builders jacked up the crib, moved it off its foundation, created a new foundation and have now placed it back on the original site. We are in



the process of getting a final bid to rebuild this special corn crib saving as much of the original wood as possible. The Barlow family, as with all struggling farmers of the day, patched and repaired the farm building with items on hand. In the picture you will see old tires, chains, large round saw blades, and the steel roof from the old windmill and silo which was used to extend its life. 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Questers Donate John Brown's Letter

CBF is pleased to accept a framed copy of the last letter written by John Brown to Lora Case the day before Brown died at Harpers Ferry. The original document is owned by the New York Public Library. Jamie Parry, of Hudson, transcribed the letter and the Anna Lee Questers presented it to CBF.

CHARLESTON, JEFFERSON CO., VA.

2nd December, 1859. "LORA CASE, Esq.

"My Dear Sir: Your most kind and cheering letter of the 28th November is received. Such an outburst of warmhearted sympathy, not only for myself but for all those 'who have no helper,' compels me to steal a moment from those allowed me in which to prepare for my last great change, to send you a few words. Such a feeling as you manifest makes you to 'shine (in my estimation) in the midst of this wicked and perverse generation as a light in the world'. May you ever prove yourself equal to the high estimate I have placed on you. Pure and undefiled religion before God and the Father is, as I understand it, an active not a dormant principle. I do not undertake to direct any more about my children. I leave that now entirely to their excellent mother, from whom I have just parted. I send you my 'salutation with my own hand.' Remember me to all your and my dear friends.

Hudson's Fire Protection

Fires were always a concern to farmers. In fact, several small fires happened at CBF. Evidence of one of these fires is still visible in the NW corner of the bank barn.

- 1800 Bucket brigades & wet blankets
- 1842 Hook & Ladder Co. of Hudson
- 1849 16 men to pull a 2-wheel hose cart
- 1853 A small fire pump purchased \$250
- 1858 Horse drawn hand pumper \$621.17
 - Button & Blake, 16 men to operate pumper
- 1879 Water cisterns at Baldwin & Main, Aurora & College, and the Village Green
- 1896 Dept. housed at town hall, Church St
- 1911 Pumper used for last time
- 1928 Village buys Seagrave Truck
- 1930 Township organized its own Dept.
- 1932 Township buys Ahres Fox Truck,
both housed at Church St. Station
- 1945 Pumper loaned to Summit Historical Society.
- 1954 New station at S. Main & Streetsboro
- 1963 Old pumper brought back to Hudson
- 1979 New station house on South Oviatt Street
